CITY COUNCIL MEETING
MARCH 3, 2014**

The City Council met in regular session at City Hall at 7:00 p.m. on Monday, March 3, 2014.

MEMBERS PRESENT: Mayor Ron Blachford, Aldermen Tony Rangel, Tom Winsell, Joe Zeller, Jim Odegaard and Alderwomen Mary Johnson, Kristin Hargens.

CALL TO ORDER: Mayor Blachford called the meeting to order.

Pledge of Allegiance was said by all present.

AGENDA: Motion by Alderwoman Hargens, seconded by Alderman Odegaard to approve the agenda with one deletion. All members voted aye. Motion carried.

MINUTES: Motion by Alderwoman Johnson, seconded by Alderman Winsell to approve the minutes for the regular meeting held on February 18, 2014. All members voted aye. Motion carried.

PUBLIC INPUT: Mayor Blachford presented a rough draft of an article from the Miller Press for the council to review regarding the water, sewer and storm sewer infrastructure. Also, Mayor Blachford visited the 4th grade at Miller Elementary and talked about local government. He was very impressed with the questions the kids asked and was taking a copy of the agenda, minutes, ordinance and resolution as well as our Code book for them to view.

NEW BUSINESS

Tri-State Insulation: Kurt Joy was present to question his electric bill for January. His concern was that he ground insulation on December 30 and we had already read the meters for December, this caused his January electric to be on a demand charge. Motion by Alderman Zeller, seconded by Alderman Odegaard to refer this to the Utility Committee meeting on Thursday with a special meeting set early next week to make a decision. All members voted aye. Motion carried.

Peterka Easement: Motion by Alderman Rangel, seconded by Alderman Winsell to have Peterkas obtain an easement from their attorney for access through the ditch to the golf course. All members voted aye. Motion carried.

Annual Report: Mayor Blachford complimented the department heads, council and finance office for a great step in the right direction regarding the city finances. There were no funds transferred from the enterprise funds to the general fund for 2013.

NECOG Meeting: Mayor Blachford attended the NECOG meeting in Aberdeen on February 26. Mark Lawson, executive director of SD Housing Authority spoke regarding a new program that is currently in legislation regarding the housing issues throughout South Dakota. They hope

to have more funds to provide loans for the Governor's houses, home improvements and to build multiplex units.

2014 Municipal Election: There was no opposition for Tom Winsell - ward one, Mary Johnson – ward two and Anthony Rangel - ward three, therefore there will not be a municipal election this year.

Tabletop Folder: Motion by Alderman Odegaard, seconded by Alderwoman Hargens to purchase a tabletop folder to fold the new bills at a cost of approximately \$625.00. All members voted aye. Motion carried.

Tri-State Insulation – Electric Bill: Tri-State Insulation is questioning their January bill. They were grinding on December 30, 2013, and we had already read the meter for December. This caused their January usage to be charged at the demand rate. Bill Lewellen, electric superintendent, stated that we have never read the meters on exactly the first of the month as it takes several days to read the meters throughout town. Miller had to pay for the electricity that was used at Tri-State and the city already lost about \$340.00 on that bill with the high demand rate that we had to pay. Amy Howard and Tiffany Hofer, Economic Development, spoke on Tri-State's behalf stating that the issue was that the meter was read in December but the bill states usage was from January 1 to February 1, 2014.

Motion by Alderman Rangel seconded by Alderman Winsell to have Tri-State pay the bill in full via a payment plan if necessary. Roll call vote: Alderman Rangel – aye, Alderman Odegaard – nay, Alderman Winsell – aye, Alderwoman Hargens – aye, hearing 3 ayes and 1 nay, motion carried.

Motion by Alderman Rangel, seconded by Alderman Odegaard to adjourn the meeting. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 1:02 p.m. All members voted aye. Motion carried.

Police Department Report

1. DARE Officer Chris Henrickson started DARE classes at the Grade school on March 6. The classes will last for ten weeks with DARE Graduation being held in May.
2. Officer Jim Henson attended a 3.5 hour Terminal Operator class that was held in Pierre on March 11, 2014.
3. The officers will be attending a two hour refresher course on SFST's (Standard Field Sobriety Tests) at the fire hall. Law Enforcement trainer Monte Farnsworth of Pierre will be the instructor.
4. The police department assisted the Highway Patrol and the Hand County Sheriff's Office with a sobriety checkpoint that was held on March 8, 2014.

Street Department

1. We put ALL new hydraulic hoses on the concrete breaker. I also took the breaker to have the nitrogen pressures checked (if it loses pressure the impact capability is less per blow).
2. We both went to MSHA class.
3. We helped move stuff in the old band room, helped demolish the old office, & removed the carpet.
4. David helped with the two water leaks (by Day Care & McWhorter Museum).
5. We pumped water in several areas where the storm sewers were frozen and where we will install one this summer.
6. We plowed snow a couple of times.
7. We worked the red Chevy pickup Distributor cap, rotor, and spark plugs.
8. We bladed several roads around town (some were hard and some were really soft).
9. I watered some gravel roads with the sucker truck when I was working on some frozen storm drains.

Water Department Report

1. We still have 10 houses that are hooked to other houses due to frozen water lines. The machine I have ordered to thaw out these lines has been on back order due to high demand. We have replaced 10 meters that have frozen so far.
2. We had a water main break on highway 45 by the old school. Olson construction came and fixed it. It was a 6" cast iron main.
3. I will be publishing the annual drinking water report in the paper within the next month.
4. I will be attending a sponsor ship meeting in Spearfish on March 25th. The day before the Airport conference begins. This meeting is with Helm's, State DOT, & the FAA. They will be reviewing the upcoming runway project.
5. SPN will have the sewer cleaning & camera project ready to bid real soon.

Here is a summary that I sometimes use on Annexation. We have discussed before that strict compliance is required for annexation statutes. At p 2 is the City of Rapid City case summary that I referenced. It appears that the Legislature subsequently took action to allow annexation of airports even if there is no adjoining or contiguity to the city limits. I will send those statutes by separate email. SCCL 9-4-1 makes reference to golf courses but not in a way that helps. If the county owns land that adjoins the city limits which reaches a common border to the golf course that might be an option, if they are ok with it, even if that is not the most direct path. The corridor or strip of land approach leading to the golf course will not likely be allowed by the courts. See p 2 again of this Summary. I take it that there may be opposition by homeowners between the limits and the golf course. It is not on the map you sent, so I am going by memory.
